# Milwaukee Police & Youth Listening Circles #6

March 27, 2019

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## **Executive Summary**

The sixth Milwaukee Police & Youth Listening Circles session was hosted at the Don & Sallie Davis Boys & Girls Club on March 27, 2019. Milwaukee police officers, and youth participated in five listening circles, each led by a trained facilitator from the Zeidler Center. The topic of this session was "Enjoying life in the neighborhood". During the Facilitated Dialogue, each participant was given the opportunity to respond to two rounds of questions:

"Describe a time when you saw or heard about youth and officers having fun in the neighborhood. What came to mind?"

"What activity would be cool to do with police and youth over the summer? Where would you like it to happen?"

After the Facilitated Dialogue, participants were invited to speak in the Connected Conversation. This is an open conversation that encourages participants to follow up with each other by discussing what was heard during the structured part of the facilitated dialogue. To initiate the discussion, participants were invited to answer the following questions:

## For youth:

"What comes to your mind when you see an officer come in a room?"

"What, if any, police policies are confusing to you? Which did you want to know more about?"

#### For officers:

"What is your favorite activity to do in the neighborhood and why?"

#### For all:

"What questions of curiosity do you have for each other that came up during the go-arounds?"

Finally, participants were invited to make a pledge and respond to the following question: "What is one thing you will do in the neighborhood to get to know a youth/officer better?" Overall, many participants pledged to instigate conversation between one another when they see each other in the neighborhood and connect with each other at neighborhood events and through sports.

The topic of these Listening Circles was defined by some of the youth who participated in the Zeidler Center Youth Facilitator Training which involved Don & Sallie Boys and Girls Club youth.

## Annex – Pledges

<u>Pledge Prompt</u>: "What is one thing you will do in the neighborhood to get to know a youth/officer better?"

- I will talk to officers and ask them where they grew up and what it was like there.

- I will spend more time with them.
- I will help a youth to get to his bus and help a youth to shovel snow.
- I will ask a police officer that I see outside about his family, his job, and what their favorite things to do are.
- I will make an effort to do park and walks when I am patrolling neighborhoods in Milwaukee.
- I will make an effort to speak to police in general, because I do not speak to police right now, on purpose.
- Come to more listening circles.
- Continue to stop and talk to youth in areas/neighborhoods in which I patrol.
- Ask officers more questions when they're in my neighborhood.
- Talk with officers in my neighborhood.
- Help people in need with officers especially the elderly.
- Playing basketball with officers while having a conversation.
- Block parties.
- I would like to play football with an officer.
- While on duty I will continue to pull over when I'm afforded some free time in between calls to talk to the youth and also sit on the porches and have conversations with the residents in the neighborhood.
- I like checking in on the youth at their homes that have been absent from school and see how their doing. There are some youth who need a little more motivating, so I might challenge them to show up for school and with an incentive. I.e. breakfast etc.
- I will give an officer or youth 1 vs. 1 game to play with me to help us connect.
- I will continue to offer my friendship to both youth and the officers I come in contact with.
